Monday, October 16, 2023 | Session 1 Zion Hill Baptist Church

The opening video, "This We Pray" was played at the beginning of the meeting to point to the theme for the new year.

Pastor David Wilson welcomed everyone & led us in prayer.

Ed King, Moderator, called us into session for the 138th Annual Meeting. He asked for a motion to seat the Messengers & adopt the program. A motion was made & seconded, the motion passed. He also welcomed our guests & invited them to any meeting we have at the Association.

Justin Johnson, AMS, came to say a special thanks & appreciation to the pastors, recognized the new pastors since we last met, & asked everyone to remember the churches without a pastor in prayer.

New pastors: Kevin Treadaway (Jones Chapel), Jerry Lowe (New Salem), & Shane Cogdill (Boyd's Creek, int.)

Churches without a pastor: Blowing Cave, French Broad Valley, & Laurel Branch.

Zion Hill's praise team led us in worship. We sang "Send the Light" & "How Great Thou Art".

Justin Johnson, AMS, introduced Valerie Millsapps as the speaker for the Ministry Spotlight. Valerie, CEO of Pregnancy Resource Center, came to share about this ministry, shared a video of a brave mom, & reminded us of the various ways we can connect with them.

Glenn Metts, Vice Moderator, led us in electing a Moderator for the upcoming year. David Wilson, Pastor of Millican Grove, nominated Ed King to serve a second term. During New Business, Bill Stephens, Chair of the Constitution & Bylaws Committee, came forward with a recommendation to update the Constitution. The updates are highlighted in red in the Book of Reports. This will be voted on in the second session.

We watched the "Golden Offering Overview" video from the Tennessee Baptist Mission Board.

Kelsie Clabo & Stephanie Randolph of Zion Hill presented a gift basket to giveaway on behalf of the Association. Bill Stephens was the recipient.

Justin Johnson, AMS, introduced Joe Sorah, TBMB Representative, to come & share a word on behalf of the TBMB. He talked about the growth that is coming to TN and encouraged us to prepare for the mission field it will present. He shared that the TBMB gives back 15% of what our Association gave to the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions. This year, our Association received \$_____ in return.

Macy Miller, student of Shiloh Baptist Church, & Justin Johnson, AMS, sang "The Blessing" for the offering.

Pastor Justin Randolph, Zion Hill, preached from Matthew 24:36-51. He encouraged us to join God where He is working, even if it's something new. He also warned us from having a cavalier attitude, a careless attitude, & a callous attitude.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. Name

This body shall be called the Sevier County Association of Baptists, Inc.

Article II. Purpose

The purpose of this association shall be:

- to promote Christian fellowship and cooperation among the churches affiliated with this body;
- to encourage mutual cooperation with the Tennessee Baptist Convention and Southern Baptist Convention in carrying out the Great Commission;
- to uphold the doctrines of our Baptist faith as stated in the Baptist Faith and Message of 2000.
- to affirm that marriage is recognized and accepted to be the union of one man and one woman in holy matrimony; regardless of any law or statement made opposing this whether by local, state, national government, or Supreme Court ruling.

Article III. Authority

This Association is a self-determining body under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. It determines its own membership and programs, but has no authority over the churches affiliated with it. However, the Association may, upon invitation from a church, advise with that church. It may also withdraw fellowship from a church considered by the Association to be out of harmony in doctrine or conduct.

Article IV. Membership

Section 1. Affiliation

A Baptist church desiring affiliation with the Association will present its petition to the Executive Board accompanied by satisfactory evidence of doctoral regularity, proper constitution, and acceptable cooperation. Upon approval by the Executive Board, churches may be received into affiliation by a two-thirds majority vote of the annual session.

Section 2. Messengers

Messengers from the churches shall constitute the annual session of the Association. Each church of the association shall be entitled to two messengers for the first fifty members and one additional messenger for every fifty members or the majority thereof, plus two alternate messengers. These are to attend and vote only in the event of the absence of the regular messengers. The pastor or interim pastor will automatically be a messenger. No church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers including the pastor.

Section 3. Dismissal

Should any church disqualify itself by practices or doctrines contrary to those of the Association, or fail to send an Annual Church Profile and/or messengers for three consecutive years, the Executive Board may, upon failing to reconcile such church, recommend dismissal. A two-thirds majority vote in annual session will be required to withdraw fellowship from a church.

Section 1. Officers

Article V. Organization

The general officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (or Clerk/Treasurer), Sunday School Director, Discipleship Director, WMU Director, Men's Ministry Director, Camp Smoky Director, Music Director, Youth Director, Evangelism Director, and other officers as the Association deems necessary, and Associational Mission Strategist.

A. Moderator and Vice Moderator

The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall be elected on the first session of the annual meeting of the Association. Nominations shall be made from the floor. These officers shall take office at the close of the annual session at which they are elected and shall serve through the next annual meeting of the Association. The Moderator and Vice Moderator are eligible to serve two (2) one-year terms in succession. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings of the Executive Board and annual session unless such responsibility is designated to the Vice Moderator or other proper person.

B. The Nominating Committee shall nominate the following officers, which shall be elected by the Association annually. In addition, the Nominating Committee shall nominate members of the committees listed in Section 2.

- 1. <u>Clerk.</u> The clerk shall record the proceedings of the annual session and general board meetings and prepare them for print; to preserve all permanent records of this body; and to perform such duties as may be required by order of this body.
- 2. <u>Treasurer</u>. The Treasurer shall work with the Associational Mission Strategist and Administrative Assistant concerning the funds of the Association. They shall be one of three persons authorized to sign for disbursement of associational funds.
- 3. <u>Sunday School Director</u>. Supervise the organization and function of the Sunday School Ministry of the Association.
- 4. **<u>Discipleship Director</u>**. To supervise the organization and function of the Discipleship Ministry of the Association.
- 5. WMU Director. Supervise the organization and function of the WMU Ministry of the Association.
- 6. <u>Men's Ministry</u> Director. Supervise the organization and function of the Men's Ministry of the Association.
- 7. <u>Music Director</u>. Supervise the organization and function of the Music Ministry of the Association.
- 8. **Youth Director**. Supervise the organization and function of the Youth Ministry of the Association.
- 9. **Evangelism Director**. Supervise the organization and function of the Evangelism Ministry of the Association.

Section 2. Committees

The committees of the Association shall be the Camp Smoky Committee, Constitution and By-Laws Committee, Annual Meeting Program Committee, Finance Committee, Missions/Church Planter Committee, Nominating Committee, Personnel Committee, Time and Place Committee, and other committees deemed necessary by this body. The number of each committee shall be determined by the Nominating Committee but shall be in multiples of three, with one-third of the members elected

each year for 3-year terms. The Associational Mission Strategist, Moderator, and Vice Moderator shall be Ex-Officio members of all committees.

Section 3. Executive Board

- A. The Executive Board shall be composed of the pastor and two lay members from each church who are elected annually by the church. The general officers of the Association, and chairmen of all general committees of the Association shall be voting members of the Executive board.
- **B. Officers and Committees**: The officers and committees of the Association shall be the officers and committees of the Executive Board.
- **C. Authority:** The Executive Board shall have authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by this Constitution and any other limits so set by the annual session.
- D. Meetings: The Executive Board shall meet monthly on the last Monday of each month, with the following exceptions: the meeting in May shall be on the Monday preceding Memorial Day, October shall have no Executive Board Meeting instead the Association Annual Meeting shall be held, and there shall be no Executive Board Meeting in December. The Moderator may call special meetings with sufficient advance notice to the membership stating time, place, and purpose of the meeting. A quorum shall be constituted when five (5) Associational churches are represented in the Executive Board Meetings. A specific number of churches is not required for Special Called Meetings.
- **E. The Associational Council**: The Associational Council shall be composed of the officers of the Association and the program organization leaders. The Moderator shall serve as chairman and the Clerk as secretary. The Council shall meet prior to each Executive Board Meeting on the same day as the Executive Board Meeting. The Council shall not be required to meet prior to a Special Called Meeting.

Section 4. Trustees

A Board of Trustees, consisting of six members with one-third of the members elected each for a three-year term, shall be nominated annually by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association. The responsibilities of the Trustees include:

- 1. To hold in charge, for and in the name of the Association, the titles to all properties of the Association.
- 2. To negotiate the transfer of titles in case of purchase, or sale of real estate by the Association.
- 3. To act under the direction of the Executive Board in relation to titles of property and securing of loans for the Association.

Section 5. Facilities

1. The Sevier County Association of Baptists adopts the policy that only member churches of the Association have access to the Association's properties and facilities for performing weddings, including, but not limited to, the Association's office complex and the campus of Camp Smoky.

2. The facilities of the Sevier County Association of Baptists, including, but not limited to, the Association's office complex and the campus of Camp Smoky, shall not be used for any activity that is against our Biblical faith statement and beliefs as outlined in the 2000 Baptist Faith & Message, the Sevier County Association of Baptist's Constitution and By-Laws, and the motion made and adopted by the Executive Board representatives at the September 28, 2015 monthly meeting.

Article VI. Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of this body shall be held beginning the third Monday night in October and continuing through Tuesday evening.

Article VII. Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any annual session of this body provided that one day's notice shall be given to any proposed amendment and that two-thirds of the messenger's present concur.

By-Laws

The latest edition of Roberts Rules of Order shall be used as authority in deliberation.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS

Article I - Name

This body shall be called the Sevier County Association of Baptists, Inc. Baptist Association.

Article II - Vision & Mission

The purpose of this association shall be:

- To promote Christian fellowship and cooperation among the churches affiliated with this body;
- To encourage mutual cooperation with the Tennessee Baptist Convention and Southern Baptist Convention in carrying out the Great Commission;
- To uphold the doctrines of our Baptist faith as stated in the Baptist Faith and Message 2000;
- To affirm that marriage is recognized and accepted to be the union of one man and one woman in holy matrimony; regardless of any law or statement made opposing this – whether by local, state, national government, or Supreme Court ruling.

The vision for the Sevier County Baptist Association is to mobilize churches to strategically engage our community with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

We will see this vision fulfilled by:

- Promoting fellowship & cooperation among our local churches, TBMB, & SBC.
- Fostering an atmosphere of genuine prayer
- Providing strategic resources/training through TBMB for discipleship that leads to a deeply rooted faith in God & His Word
- Sending Jesus-followers with the Gospel from our "Jerusalem" to the ends of the earth
- Encouraging churches to meet the physical, mental, & spiritual needs in our community

Article III - Authority

This association is a self-determining body under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. It determines its own membership and programs, but has no authority over the churches affiliated with it. However; the association may, upon invitation from a church, collaborate with the church to meet their goals. It may also withdraw fellowship from a church considered by the Association to be out of harmony in doctrine or conduct. We affirm that marriage is recognized & accepted to be the union of one man and one woman in holy matrimony, regardless of any law or statement made opposing this – whether by local, state, national government, or Supreme Court ruling.

Article IV - Membership

A - Affiliation

A Southern Baptist church desiring affiliation with the Association will present its petition to the Executive Board accompanied by satisfactory evidence of doctoral regularity, proper constitution, and acceptable cooperation. Upon approval by the Executive Board, churches may be received into affiliation by a majority vote of the Annual Meeting.

B - Messengers

Messengers from the churches shall constitute the Annual Meeting of the Association. Each church of the Association shall be entitled to two messengers for the first 50 members and one additional messenger for every 50 members, plus two alternate messengers *(not to exceed a total of 10 messengers including the pastor)*. Alternates are to attend and vote only in the event of the absence of the regular messengers. The pastor or interim pastor will automatically be a messenger.

C - **Disassociation**

Should any church disqualify itself by practices or doctrines contrary to those of the Association, or fail to send an Annual Church Profile (henceforth ACP) and/or Messengers for three consecutive years, the Executive Board may, upon failing to reconcile such church, recommend disassociating with said church. A majority vote in the Annual Meeting will be required to withdraw fellowship from a church.

Article V - Organization

A - Officers (intended to take the place of Article V - Section 1.A & 1.B) Officers of the Association shall be as follows:

- Associational Mission Strategist (AMS) the role of the AMS is to first & foremost be a servant leader of the Association. *Foundationally*, the AMS must be called to Associational leadership, a person of character, spiritually mature, committed to learning, a leader of leaders, and trustworthy. *Relationally*, the AMS must be emotionally intelligent, an active listener, a supportive coach, authentically vulnerable, and a vocal encourager. *Strategically*, the AMS must be a vision caster, strategist, consultant, leadership multiplier, good communicator, and one with contextual understanding. The AMS may remain in office as long as the Association wishes for him to continue in this office or until he is called to leave.
- Moderator & Vice Moderator Both the Moderator and Vice Moderator should be well-versed in parliamentary law and should be thoroughly familiar with the Bylaws and Constitution of the Association. The Moderator will conduct business at Executive Board meetings as well as the Annual Meeting. In the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator will become the presiding officer. The duties of the Moderator include: opening the meetings at the appointed time by calling the meeting into order, having ascertained that a quorum is present; recognizing members who are entitled to the floor; stating and putting to vote all questions that legitimately come before the assembly as motions; protecting the assembly from obvious dilatory motions or

disorder; expediting business in every way compatible with the rights of members; and declaring the meeting adjourned when the assembly so votes, at the time prescribed in the program, or at any time in the event of a sudden emergency affecting the safety of those present. The Moderator & Vice Moderator may serve two (2) years unless they wish to vacate their position early. Both positions will be elected at the Annual Meeting and will take office at the close of the Annual Meeting. Nominations may be made from the floor at the Annual Meeting and must have a majority vote to be elected.

- □ Treasurer The treasurer of the Association is the officer entrusted with verifying financial records & keeping the Board informed of financial status throughout the year via Financial Reports & the Treasurer's Report at the Annual Meeting. He/She may be a signer on the Association's account. The Treasurer may serve multiple terms (*if approved by the messengers at the Annual Meeting*) but is only asked to serve for one (1) year.
- Clerk/Secretary The Clerk/Secretary is the recording officer of the Association for Special-called, Executive Board, & Annual Meeting. The Clerk/Secretary may serve multiple terms (*if approved by the messengers at the Annual Meeting*) but is only asked to serve for one (1) year.
- Men's Ministry Director Responsible for organizing events and projects throughout the year alongside the AMS to encourage church cooperation & fellowship. The Men's Ministry director may serve multiple terms (*if approved by the messengers at the Annual Meeting*) but is only asked to serve for one (1) year.
- WMU Director Responsible for organizing meetings & projects throughout the year alongside the AMS to encourage church cooperation & fellowship. The WMU Director may serve multiple terms (*if approved by the messengers at the Annual Meeting*) but is only asked to serve for one (1) year.

C - Associational Teams (intended to take the place of Article V - Section 2)

Team members are asked to serve for at least one (1) year, but may serve multiple terms if approved by a majority vote at the Annual Meeting. Team Members may be asked to step down if they are not fulfilling their duties as active team members. Each team below will need to have an odd number of members so voting (if needed) can take place.

- **Administrative** (Stewardship, Personnel, Constitution/Bylaws, Recommendations/Nominations)
- Discipleship (Small Groups, Prayer, Youth/Children, Contact for Supported Ministries)
- Ministry/Missions (Ministry/Missions, Evangelism, WMU/Women on Mission, Men's Ministry, Disaster Relief)
- **Vision** (Vision-Casting, Event Planning, Future Development)
- **Campus Ministry** (Camp Smoky, Summer Camp, Campus Events)

D - Executive Board

- The voting members of the Executive Board shall be composed of the pastor and two lay members from each church who are elected annually by the church. Officers and Associational Team Leaders shall also be voting members of the Executive Board.
- 2) The Executive Board shall have authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by this Constitution and any other limits so set by the Annual Meeting.
- 3) The Executive Board shall meet monthly on the last Monday of each month, with the following exceptions: the meeting in May shall be on the Monday preceding Memorial Day, October shall have no Executive Board meeting instead, the Associational Annual Meeting shall be held, and there shall be no Executive Board meeting in December. A Special-Called meeting shall require sufficient advance notice to all members from the AMS or Moderator stating the time, place, and purpose of the meeting. A quorum shall be constituted when five (5) Associational churches are represented in the Executive Board Meetings. A specific number of churches is not required for Special-Called Meetings.
- 4) An Executive Council shall be composed of the Officers & Associational Team Leaders. The Moderator shall serve as chairman and the Clerk as secretary. The Council shall meet prior to each Executive Board Meeting on the same day as the Executive Board Meeting. The Council shall not be required to meet prior to a Special-Called Meeting.
- 5) If the Moderator and Vice Moderator are absent from a scheduled meeting, a temporary Moderator may be nominated & elected to serve at the specific meeting.
- 6) If an officer position becomes vacant before the Annual Meeting, the Executive Board may nominate & elect, as needed, a person to fill the vacancy to complete the unexpired term.

E - Trustees

A Board of Trustees, consisting of five members each elected for a three-year term, shall be nominated annually by the Administrative Team and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting. The responsibilities of the Trustees include:

- To hold in charge, for and in the name of the Association, the titles to all properties of the Association
- To negotiate the transfer of title in case of purchases, or sale of real estate by the Association or its entities
- To act under the direction of the Executive Board in relation to titles of property and securing of loans for the Association

F - Facilities

The Sevier County Baptist Association adopts the policy that only member churches of the Association have access to the Association's properties and facilities, including, but not limited to the Association's office complex and Camp Smoky, for performing weddings, birthdays, and family reunions. The aforementioned properties and facilities, along with the Block Party Trailer and Disaster Relief Trailers, shall not be used for any activity that is against not in agreement with our Biblical faith statement and beliefs as outlined in the Baptist Faith & Message 2000, the Association's Constitution & Bylaws, and the motion made & adopted by the Executive Board representatives at the September 28, 2015 Executive Board Meeting.

Article VI - Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of this body shall be held beginning the third Monday night in October and continuing through Tuesday evening on the third Monday & Tuesday evenings in October each year.

Article VII - Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any Associational Annual Meeting provided that at least one day's notice is given – as well as time for discussion – to any proposed amendment and that a majority of the messengers present concur represented vote in favor of said amendment.

By-Laws

The latest edition of Robert's Rule of Order shall be used as authority in deliberation. To uphold the doctrines of our Baptist faith as stated in the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.



Baptist Memorial Health Care began as a 150-bed hospital in downtown Memphis in 1912. It was formed by the Southern Baptist Conventions of Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas because they recognized a tremendous need for a health care facility in this part of the country. The hospital eventually grew to become the largest private hospital in the world.

The Baptist Memorial Health Care system was created in 1981 to provide an integrated health care delivery system offering a full continuum of care to communities throughout the Mid-South. Today, a total of 24 hospitals in Arkansas, Tennessee and Mississippi; an 1,100-member physician group; and dozens of other entities are affiliated with Baptist.

The series, named in memory of a beloved member of Baptist's Board of Trustees and the founder of Tabernacle Baptist Church in Clarksville, Tennessee, welcomes a speaker each month to deliver an evangelical message from Baptist's flagship hospital. Video recordings of each event are posted on our Facebook page. They have been viewed more than 140,000 times and have reached 116,000 people in the past year.
- The Jackson Clinic and Baptist opened the Jackson Clinic-Baptist Outpatient Campus in Jackson, Tennessee. The campus' first facility, a 155,000-square-foot, two-story medical building, includes an outpatient surgery department, diagnostic services and 148 patient exam rooms.
- The Spence and Becky Wilson Baptist Children's Hospital in Memphis is beginning a \$1.2 million project to expand its ear, nose and throat; orthopedic; and general surgical services. Funded by the Baptist Memorial Health Care Foundation, the project will allow the hospital to accommodate up to 286 new surgeries a year.
- The Baptist Health Sciences University College of Osteopathic Medicine's first class of about 90 students will begin their studies in August. Earlier this year, we hosted a ribbon cutting for the 100,000-square-foot College of Osteopathic Medicine building, and First Horizon Bank generously pledged \$1 million to the Baptist College of Osteopathic Medicine Capital Campaign.
- Lown Institute, a nonpartisan think tank, announced that Baptist Memphis had a "fair share surplus" of \$34 million meaning we gave back that much more to our communities than we received in estimated tax breaks. No other Tennessee hospital had a surplus that large.

Baptist & Reflector

Since 1835, the *Baptist and Reflector* has produced and shared articles and columns that impact Tennessee Baptist Convention churches.

The B&R is mailed to nearly homes 26 weeks a year, reaching nearly 40,000 readers. For nearly 11 years in a row, the B&R staff has been recognized for excellence in journalism by the Baptist Communicators Association in its annual awards competition.

In addition, the B&R website has grown steadily since it was introduced in late 2015. Our number of page views grows steadily. We also send out a weekly newsletter highlighting not only the top stories in the print issue but other articles that are posted on the website but may not appear in the print issue.

The goal of the paper is to "tell the story of Tennessee Baptists" through news, feature stories and photographs. In 2024, the paper focused on articles highlighting the Five Objectives, a 10-year focus that ends this year while at the same time beginning coverage of stories featuring the Acts 2:17 Initiative which messengers approved at last year's annual meeting in Chattanooga.

In addition, the B&R continued to inform Tennessee Baptists about BlueOval City, located in Haywood County, roughly 40 miles east of Memphis. BlueOval City in Stanton will eventually become a massive Ford plant that covers approximately 4,100 acres. Upcoming articles will continue to keep readers informed of the numerous opportunities that will be available in the months and years to come in West Tennessee.

Tennessee Baptists already have been involved in a lot of disaster relief efforts throughout our state and nation. Teams recently served in Iowa and Texas.

The *Baptist and Reflector* continues to utilize social media tools such as Twitter and Facebook and other outlets to keep Tennessee Baptists aware of breaking news.

The staff monitors trends that could affect Tennessee Baptists and prints those stories to keep readers informed. We also have kept our readers informed of current events throughout the Southern Baptist Convention as well.

The paper continually seeks to enlist new subscribers, either through individual subscriptions or our church plan. We need more churches willing to send the paper to their leadership such as deacons, Sunday School teachers, etc.

Associational Report 2024

Carson-Newman University

From a dream, to development, to its August 1851 opening, Baptists of this state have been instrumental in the creation, maintenance and growth of Carson-Newman. Your partnership and support enable us as Christian educators to help our students reach their full potential as educated citizens and worldwide servant-leaders.

We have had a blessed year at Mossy Creek. Highlights of this past year include:

- Carson-Newman celebrated its third-largest total enrollment in its 172-year history, reporting admission of 2,735 students a nearly 6% increase from the previous year.
- The University graduated a total of 600 students during the 2023-24 school year.
- The University entered its third year of a five-year strategic plan entitled "*Acorns to Oaks: Pursuing God's Preferred Future.*" The first fruits of this initiative were opening and utilizing the new state-of-the-art Drama and Ted Russell Center, home to C-N's School of Health Sciences.
- As of July 2024, the University is overseeing the final stages of completion of the largest construction project in its history West Campus Commons. This 110,000 sq. foot residence life complex will house 524 students this fall.
- The University broke ground on a new Child Development Lab. This educational facility overseen by the Family & Consumer Science Department will afford children a new learning environment promoting physical, emotional, social, cognitive and language development, while also providing C-N students needed hands-on experience instrumental in their academic pursuits.
- Other campus projects included a new playing surface in Holt Fieldhouse, new turf for McCown Soccer Field and Burke-Tarr Stadium, as well as a stadium video screen and scoreboard.
- The University opened a new Recreation Park on the west end of campus. This facility includes two pickleball courts, two basketball courts, three beach volleyball courts, a softball field, a soccer field and a seating area.
- The Princeton Review cited C-N in its "2024 Best Colleges: Region by Region." It also recognized C-N in its "Best Online Nursing School Master's Program." The University was also named a "College of Distinction" and a "Christian College of Distinction" by the organization Colleges of Distinction for the 10th consecutive year.
- Christianity Today cited the archeological dig of Hyrcania, Herod the Great's desert fortress, in its "Biblical Archeology's Top 10 Discoveries for 2023." The dig was performed by teams from Carson-Newman, Hebrew University, and American Veterans Archeological Recovery.
- In partnership with First Baptist Church Mt. Juliet and Mount Juliet Christian Academy, C-N opened the Nashville Education Center, expanding options for those in Middle Tennessee seeking a C-N degree.
- The University had a successful first year with its new Prison Ministry at Morgan County Correctional Complex. The cohort of 14 students began their pursuit of a Bachelor of Arts in Christian Studies with an emphasis in Ministry Studies. By the end of the Spring Semester, the majority of students made either the President's (4.0 GPA) or Dean's (3.5 3.9 GPA) lists.
- In partnership with Manley Baptist Church, we were grateful that students chose to express public professions of faith in Christ by being baptized in Mossy Creek on C-N's campus during the fall. There were many other public professions of faith who chose to pursue baptism at their home churches instead of in Mossy Creek. We celebrate the life-changing impact of the Gospel that is transforming lives across our campus.
- Partnering with NAMB's GenSend program, C-N students spread the love of Christ, serving on mission trips in Denver, Los Angeles, Honolulu, Washington, D.C., and Honduras.
- The University presented the annual Ken Sparks Award to 1987 alumnus Jeff Lovingood, who serves as senior associate pastor at First Baptist Cleveland.

Highlights presented here are made possible because of the cooperation, support and generosity of Tennessee Baptists.

- Financial Sustainability: We have made significant strides in our financial sustainability, transitioning from a reliance on development funding to cover operations to a remarkable decrease of nearly 60%. - Smothers Road Ownership: Smothers Road, the access road to The King's Academy, is now privately owned. This exciting development allows us greater control over our campus security and traffic management. As part of our ongoing commitment to ensuring the safety of our students and staff, we are initiating the process of installing gates throughout the campus. These gates will enhance security measures and regulate access, providing peace of mind for our TKA community.

These highlights are just a glimpse into the incredible things that Christ is doing on our campus. As we continue to uphold our mission and values, we eagerly anticipate even more blessings, transformations, and opportunities to witness God's hand at work in the lives of our students, staff, and community.

At Union University, we are honored to partner with Tennessee Baptists as we pursue our mission of providing Christ-centered education that promotes excellence and character development in service to Church and society. The encouragement, prayers, and support of our Tennessee Baptist friends are invaluable in our work of preparing students for a lifetime of service and leadership.



Our motto, "Religio et Eruditio," is a Latin phrase that can be translated as "Religion and Education." Or, put another way, "Faith and Learning." As such, we've adopted a new tagline at Union: "Where Faith and Knowledge Unite." That tagline encompasses the work we do. Uncompromising in our convictions, committed to the truth of Scripture, and passionate about providing students with an excellent education, we seek to be a place where students don't sacrifice academic rigor or faithfulness to Christ. Christ is Lord over every discipline, and students at Union learn what it means to be Christian teachers, nurses, business leaders, scientists, parents, neighbors, and professionals in whatever path they pursue.

The Lord has continued to bless Union over the past year. Some highlights include:

- We continue to work toward completion of our comprehensive fundraising campaign, "Union 200: Tradition. Truth. Transformation." Our goal is \$80 million, and just over \$45 million has been given and pledged toward that goal thus far.
- Construction is well underway on a new academic building on the Great Lawn that will house the McAfee School of Business and the computer science and engineering departments. We expect the building to be completed during the 2025 spring semester.
- We've filled several key leadership positions over the last year, including Jacob Shatzer as provost, Ray Van Neste as vice president for university ministries, Kenneth Lewis as dean for the Memphis College of Urban and Theological Studies, Dan Slater as dean for the McAfee School of Business, Todd Stanfield as dean for the School of Social Work, and Kim Jones as dean for the College of Pharmacy.
- Union's School of Theology and Missions recently published a new book, *Recognizing and Responding to the Messiah: Sermons on the Gospel of Mark*, a collection of chapel sermons from Union faculty and staff.
- We announced plans to move forward with fundraising for a new chapel, a facility that will embody Union's steadfast dedication to Christ-centered education.
- Graduates from our Bachelor of Science in Nursing program in Jackson scored a 100 percent pass rate on the national registered nurse licensure exam. The national pass rate was 87.62 percent.

Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes, Inc. Report to Associations, 2024

Phase 1 of the construction of Baptist Village in Humboldt is complete! However, there have been some significant financial issues that have caused a, hopefully temporary, hold on opening. So, we are a bit cautious about making predictions about when this ministry will be available. More about that later in this report. When the entire Baptist Village Humboldt project is completed, there will be 10 duplexes serving 20 financially needy retired pastors and missionaries.

Regarding the financial issues mentioned above, we have downsized our ministry. Here is a snapshot of the steps we took to downsize.

- As White House, in Lebanon, had only 3/8 residents in May, these three men were moved to the one vacancy at Nabi House and the two male vacancies at Rainbow Acres, Jacksboro. This was accomplished in May 2024.
- As White House, in Lebanon, was built to be a group home and, therefore, likely not appealing to a single family looking for a home, the women who live at our Brooks Home facility in Nashville were moved to the larger White House location. Half of the women were moved on June 14th and the other half on June 29th.
- Now that the Brooks Home facility is vacant, it will be freshened up and prepared to be sold. It is in Davidson County and is a single-family home with a finished basement; ideal for a family looking to purchase a home.

It is our hope and belief that this downsizing will make us "right sized" and that there will not be need for further downsizing. Our Father's Day Offering is one way and our best way to eliminate further cuts to our ministry. As of July 29th, receipts through the 2024 Father's Day Offering total \$405,628?

Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes has been welcoming children in hard places with the love of Christ for 133 years! Because of the faithfulness of churches, businesses and individuals who have a heart for children and families who are struggling, we have been able to serve over 255 children and their families over the past year. Thank you for your prayers, for your service, and for sharing your financial resources with TBCH. Our ministry operates without the use of government funds. We have chosen to rely on God's provision through His people to supply the resources necessary to meet the needs of the children and families we serve.

TBCH serves children through two programs. Our **Foster Care** program allows us to place children who are in the state's custody into homes where Jesus is loved and served and where children will have this godly influence in their lives for however long they reside in that home. Our foster care team and volunteers span from Memphis to Kingsport. The other program for providing gospel centered care is our **Residential Care** program. Our campuses in Brentwood, Chattanooga and Millington are all in the process of exciting changes related to our Firm Foundations Project.

One of the core values that drives our ministry is that we will provide a safe environment for the children we serve. TBCH has made changes throughout the years to fulfill this core value and we are now faced with the need to make the change in our residential care program to individual bedrooms and baths for each resident. Because of what many of our children have experienced or been exposed to, this need becomes more apparent as each year passes.

TBCH is making sacrifices to bring this vision into reality. We are reducing the size of our campuses without reducing the number of children we serve. While liquidated property is helping us put our plans into action we are still in great need of your financial assistance. Thank you to those of you whose churches give faithfully to the Cooperative Program and who also make a direct gift to TBCH through the Mother's Day Offering or through your annual missions offerings!

- 255 children served in the past year

2024 Annual Report to Associations

Since 1938 the Tennessee Baptist Foundation has been of service to Tennessee Baptists and Kingdom causes around the world. The assets under management of the Foundation have grown from \$6,577 to \$199 million during that time. God continues to bless this ministry and we are pleased to make our report to the associations as to highlights for the fiscal year 2023-24 thus far. The Foundation is pleased to offer the following services to Tennessee Baptists:

- Presenting informational Faith-based estate planning seminars for churches
- Working with individuals, helping them develop distinctively Christian personal estate plans
- Assisting individuals in their establishment of various Charitable Trusts
- Serving as Trustee of trusts and funds committed to its care
- Providing investment services to Tennessee Baptist churches, associations and institutions
- Helping churches establish Legacy Ministries
- Facilitating loans to Tennessee Baptist churches/associations
- Providing grants for qualifying new ministries and projects

Highlights of the Foundation's stewardship thus far for this fiscal year include (as of June 30, 2024):

- ✓ Client Accounts: 1,152
- ✓ Assets under management: \$199,059,742
- ✓ New accounts and additions: \$14,036,898 (17 new accounts)
- ✓ Educational scholarships: 166 totaling \$217,500 for 2024-2025 academic year. (Awarded over \$6.5 million in scholarships since 1987)
- ✓ Special Project Grants: we have distributed \$18,562 to assist 4 ministry projects.
- ✓ Cooperative Program: \$356,260 distributed. Projected to give over \$500,000 by October 31
- ✓ Baptist and charitable causes: \$2,641,514 distributed. Projected to give over \$3.5 million by October 31
- ✓ Sam Warner, former Vice President of Development at the Georgia Baptist Foundation, selected as the new President-Treasurer of the Foundation

Tennessee Woman's Missionary Union 2024 Annual Report

Tennessee WMU encourages and equips churches and individuals to engage in missions learning and involvement that enables them to fulfill the Great Commission. This report shares information about some of the state events, ministries, and initiatives that have taken place.

Christian Job Corps is a ministry of WMU that seeks to help men and women break the cycle of poverty through job and life skill classes, Bible study, and mentoring. There are 15 Tennessee Christian Job Corps sites in 13 locations. In their 2024 annual ministry reports, these sites reported 1,305 participants in their various programs, 115 graduates, four decisions for Christ, and 342 volunteers serving 16,995 volunteer hours.

Tennessee WMU missionary care ministries are supported through funds from the Missions for Life Fund and the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions.

- Missionary Parents Fellowship (MPF): On September 8-9, 2023, 18 parents of IMB missionaries gathered with program personnel at First Baptist Church Hendersonville for fellowship, information, prayer, and encouragement. Tennessee WMU supports the Tennessee MPF by maintaining its database, distributing communication/promotion materials, and helping to coordinate and host the annual state retreat.
- Encourage Collegiate MKs: Each year Tennessee WMU assigns a Missionary Kid (MK) who is attending college in Tennessee to every association so churches can encourage them. Eleven MKs were assigned to associations for the 2023-24 school year.
- Former Missionary Fellowships: Former missionaries in West, Middle, and East TN gather several times each year for fellowship, connection, and encouragement. Tennessee WMU provides funds for meals during these gatherings.
- Christmas Gifts: In December 2023, Tennessee WMU sent gifts to missionary kids and retired missionaries. A \$150 gift was sent to 12 MKs whose parents serve with IMB and are from Tennessee, and a \$50 gift was sent to 69 retired IMB missionaries born in Tennessee.
- MK Re-Entry Retreat: Seven missionary kids from Tennessee received travel assistance funds to attend the MK Re-Entry Retreat, hosted by Missouri WMU and the International Mission Board, from August 6 to 10, 2024.
- Missionary Homes in Mt. Juliet: The Tennessee Baptist Mission Board has two missionary homes in Mt. Juliet that provide much-needed rest for missionaries on stateside assignment: the Tennessee WMU Missionary House (Mary's House) and the Missions Mobilization Center (MMC) Missions House. Tennessee WMU takes care of reservations and hosts the missionary families for both houses. Donated gift cards are used to stock pantry staples and other household items.

Tennessee WMU awarded \$38,000 in scholarships to 37 students attending graduate school, seminary, and undergraduate schools in Tennessee during the 2024-25 school year. These scholarships are funded through endowments, invested funds, and the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions.

The 2023-24 Tennessee Missions Emphasis theme was "All Things Tennessee." The suggested dates for the Week of Prayer for State Missions were September 10-27, and the 2023-24 Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions goal was \$2,700,000. The total amount given as of August 12, 2024, was \$2,413,116.91. The offering year goes from September 1 – August 31.
